

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Sixth Form Dress Code

Members of the Sixth Form are leaders and highly valued members of the school community. As such, you set a standard which is noted by younger members of the school. Sixth Form students are expected to achieve high standards of work and commitment. Dress is an important part of creating a business-like approach to Sixth Form life. Leisure wear can create a false impression among younger students that the Sixth Form is a leisurely experience. You are therefore requested to wear a suit that would be suitable for business.





Sixth Form life is about preparing students for the future, therefore we expect students to be professionally attired.

Our Sixth Form dress code of a smart suit includes:

- A blazer/tailored jacket (black, blue, grey, cream)
- · Tailored trousers or skirt (black, blue, grey)
- Smart top or shirt
- Smart shoes (please see items not permitted below)
- · Sixth Form Lanyard (issued in the first half term)
- · Facial jewellery is limited to earrings or one small nose stud
- · Coats (outside the building only)
- · Hair should be dyed natural colours



What is the difference between SIXTH FORM @ UPTON breakthrough student and a ceiling student?



Effort: Working weeks



Typically, a student with 3 A level subjects:

- Is in lessons for **20 hours per week**
- Has **1 hour** of enrichment per 2 weeks
- Is in form/studying PSHE topics 2 hours per week



TOTAL CONTACT TIME
= 23 hours per week
(out of a possible 60
lessons)

- Students who work in all of their Supervised Study/Non contact time, are putting in approximately **30 hours per week** (excluding lunch)

BUT...

- A typical working week is 40 hours (9am to 5pm); the average UK worker does 43 hours a week.
- Company bosses usually work between 60 and 80 hours per week!

Effort: Working weeks



Research shows us that students who achieved three
 As at A Level, typically completed 30 hours of independent study each week – going above and beyond!

We know that this is a huge commitment.....

- -Therefore, what we do expect is that, for independent study, students should complete 8 hours per subject, per week. If a student is doing 3 A levels, this is 6 hours less than the research above suggests.
- Many students see 8 hours of work per subject a week as very 'hard work', when it really should be thought of as working to A level standard.
- Doing the full 30 is going above and beyond!

Effort: Working weeks



Use the time and space that is available to you to its best advantage:

- Supervised study on your timetable- With a teacher
- After School 'Stay and Study'
- Non-contact periods Independent Study


A Non contact period is where pupils may use the SF Centre, or the library, to study. In the SF Centre they can use the bistro facilities from 10am-2pm. When in a non contact period students must ensure that they sign in with Miss Baguley.

If students are in a supervised study they will be allocated a room on their timetable, which they must go to for that study period, equipped with work to do.


Students may only use their phones for study periods in the SF Centre.

16-19 Bursary Fund





The 16-19 Bursary Fund consists of two different types and students may be able to apply, depending on their financial circumstances. Only students who are eligible should apply. A bursary of £1,200 per annum for students in the following categories:

Young people who are 16-19 years, living independently and claiming Income Support or Universal Credit

Young people who are looked after by the Local Authority

Young people who are Care Leavers i.e. are no longer looked after by the Local Authority Young people who are 16-19 years, a parent and receiving Income Support or Universal Credit Young people who are 16-19 years and receive Income Support or Universal Credit for any reason


