



Use **subject tests** from Summer (or Autumn where applicable to gain specific feedback and act on it)

Catch up on online work through Google Classroom (This needs to be built into students' independent study time.)



Attend support sessions in subjects/ or holiday classes, where applicable. Access pastoral support.



Make a strong start with nonexamination assessments (NEAs/'coursework') in Art, English Lit/Lang, EPQ, Film Studies, Geography, History, IT, PE, D&T



Be prepared with university/ apprenticeship applications.



Prepare fully for mock examinations in November and January (October half term and the Christmas holidays will be crucial here)

THE WORKING WEEK

To succeed at A Level: 8 hours of independent work per subject per week.

Typically a student is in lessons: in form/studying PHSE: independent study time:

20 hours per week 2 hours per week 8 hours per week

16 hours independent workleft...HOW?2 hours per night after school6 hours at the weekend

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT SIXTH FORM @ UPTON Perfect Practice makes perfect Often we see students who put in lots of effort. Where this doesn't lead to progress, we might wonder why. Academic progress is about how students work as much as how long they work for.

THE EXAMPRACTICE CYCLE SIXTH FORM @ UPTON

Content

Learning and understanding the material through reviewing and recall

Life is a marathon, not a sprint: pace yourself accordingly.

Skills

Putting the knowledge into practice in high-stakes contexts.

For example, timed exam questions, tough questions, complete mock tests.

Feedback

Gaining feedback from their teacher or from mark schemes.



Miss Griffiths will review any students Personal Statement who is applying for nursing, midwifery, paramedic sciences.



Which apprenticeships are available?

There are thousands of apprenticeships in different job roles and industries. Each apprenticeship will also have a 'level' attached to it. The four levels of apprenticeship are:

Name	Level	Equivalent educational level
Intermediate	2	5 GCSE passes at A* - C or 9 - 4
Advanced	3	2 A Level passes/Level 3 Diploma/ International Baccalaureate
Higher	4, 5, 6 & 7	Foundation degree or above
Degree	6&7	Bachelor's or master's degree

Most students will look for Higher and Degree-level apprenticeships, although some Law apprenticeships are advertised under Higher Level apprenticeships.

APPRENTICESHPSTOPTIPS

Make sure that they have signed up to 'alerts' from apprenticeship websites such as gov.uk/apply-apprenticeships or notgoingtouni.co.uk

Ensure that they have a 'Personal Statement' that can be used as a cover letter.

An up to date and well formatted CV

Look out for emails from Mrs Douglas/ Book in to see Mrs Douglas

Interview assessment centre prep with Mrs Douglas later in the term

Look at specific companies (normally larger national companies) that will not advertise on apprenticeship websites i.e. Unilever, Jaguar Landrover, BUPA, NHS, Clifford Chance etc
